POSTGAME NOTES

Game 2: LSU 6, Auburn 1

- No. 5 seed LSU won the second game of the 2015 Women's College World Series against No. 4 seed Auburn by a score of 6-1. On the season, LSU is now 51-12 overall, while Auburn fell to 54-10.
- With the win, LSU will next play at 6 p.m. CT on Friday against No. 1 seed Florida. Auburn will play No. 8 seed Tennessee at 11 a.m. CT on Saturday.
- In its fourth WCWS appearance (2001, '04, '12, '15), LSU improved to 7-6 overall, while Auburn is making its first trip to the event.
- The win was the 300th of LSU head coach Beth Torina's career.
- LSU's six runs were the most for the program in its WCWS history. The previous mark was four, set against Cal on May 30, 2014.
- In the complete game performance, LSU pitcher Carley Hoover improved to 18-5 in her freshman season. Hoover allowed just one run on six hits. She added five strikeouts in the contest.
- Junior Bianka Bell hit a solo home run to left field from in the top of the first inning to put LSU on the board. The home run was Bell's 18th of the season, the single-season LSU record.
- LSU put together a four-run third inning. Sophomore Sahvanna Jaquish increased LSU's lead to 3-0 with a two-run double in the third inning before junior Kellsi Kloss added a two-run home run.
- LSU freshman Emily Griggs went 3 for 3 at the plate. Her three hits tied an LSU single-game record in the WCWS (happened three other times).
- In its first 12 games at the WCWS, LSU had tallied two total home runs. On Thursday alone, LSU added two more home runs to its WCWS total (hit by Bell and Kloss). Its 10 total hits tie the program record for the most in a WCWS game (vs. Michigan on May 27, 2004).
- Auburn's lone run came in the fifth inning. A sacrifice fly from sophomore Jenna Abbott scored senior Morgan Estell from third base. Estell had reached base via a double.
- Junior pitcher Marcy Harper fell to 12-5 on the season with the Auburn loss. She surrendered five runs on six hits in 2.2 innings of work. She also gave up one walk while striking out two batters. Junior Rachael Walters pitched 4.1 innings, giving up four hits and a run. Walters added three strikeouts.
- Auburn turned a double play in the third inning, its sixth of the 2015 NCAA Tournament.
- Attendance for the first session of the 2015 WCWS was 8,147.
